OBITUARY. LIFE AND DEATH OF L. G. PATE. After a lingering illness, Mr. L. G. Pate died in the town of Sumter, S. C., on the 28th day of May, 1883.

He was noted for his perfect gentlemanly qualities. No cloud ever, for a moment, came over his character as a gentleman.

The grand old name of gentleman defined by every Quaritan, and sold with all honorable use—was bestowed and honored by his life. He was noted for his kindness and tenderness to the unfortunate.

He was noted for his devotion to his wife. Years ago he met, wooed and wedded the lady who suited him in every respect. Their lives were beautifully blended together.

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As age began to touch them lightly with "silvery fingers" they grew more and more devoted. Their lives were one in purpose—one in aim—one in interest.

At the Auditor's Office in Sumter on all other days, except the 4th July, from the 1st June to July 20th, inclusive.

The law requires that all persons owning property, or in anywise having charge of such property, either as agent, husband, guardian, trustee, executor, administrator, &c., return the same under oath to the Auditor, who requests all persons to be prompt in making their returns.




